The Rev. Harry Smith has accepted a call to First Lutheran Church following a congregational meeting yesterday. His installation as new pastor has been tentatively set for May 5.

The Rev. Robert Kunz, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church and interim supply at First Lutheran Church, today announced Mr. Smith's acceptance.

Mr. Smith, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, Cincinnati, was for seven years a missionary in India. He is a native of Covington, Ky., and was educated at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. Mrs. Smith and their four children will remain in Cincinnati until the end of the school year, he indicated.

Mr. Smith succeeds the Rev. Daniel D. Dautenhahn, who left last June to become pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, St. Louis.

The Rev. Robert Kunz, Grace Lutheran Church pastor, has been interim pastor of First Church. Mr. Kunz will be in charge of a service by the Senior Choir, directed by Miss Katherine Chuver. Mrs. Smith and the four Smith children will attend the ceremony, then return to Cincinnati until the end of the school year. Mrs. Smith is the great-great-

granddaughter of a founder of the Missouri Synod Church.

# Smith Was Athlete

Mr. Smith was educated at Concordia College, Fort Wayne, Ind., and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, where he was an outstanding cross-country runner and basketball player. He has recently taken graduate studies at Hebrew Theological Seminary, Cincinnati.

An accomplished musician, Mr. Smith was a member of the St. Louis Philharmonic Orchestra and the St. Louis Bach Society in his student days.


