# Greetings to all in the Name of Jesus Christ, the Son of the only true and living God

Each month that I serve as the pastor here at First Lutheran I wonder what I will write in this letter. Then I sit down at the computer and talk to you about what is on my heart. And this month there are several things on my heart.

Firstly, I am still grieving the loss of Pastor Schmidt. I grieve over his suffering and pain. I grieve over his wife, Mary's suffering and pain and hurt. I grieve over our pain and suffering and confusion. And I don't know how to fix the situation except to pray. What is done, is done. But, I know that God is at work even in these things. He will provide for the Schmidts. He will heal us and provide for us as only He can heal and provide. And I know that I must turn it loose because . . .

Secondly, I know that there are Bible Classes and Adult Instruction Classes and Youth Catechism Classes to teach – Worship services to celebrate where we receive the gifts of God on Wednesday nights and Sunday mornings - There are sermons to write for adults and children. There are the Lord's sheep to feed at the Lord's Supper. There are Wednesday morning chapel services to celebrate when school is in session. And there are board meetings to attend. There are sick folks to visit at home, in nursing homes, in hospitals. There will be babies and adults to baptize. There will be new members to teach and welcome. There will be saints to bury. There will be weddings to perform. And who knows what else will come our way. And it is not just the "doing" of these things that requires time and effort, but each of these things demands time and effort in preparation. This coming year is a 150 year anniversary for our congregation. The Lord Jesus' ministry at First Lutheran will go on. As the man in the called pastoral office here at the present time, I am too concerned about First Lutheran to continue mourning. It is time to "get up and go to work." The Lord will provide for the Schmidts.

**Thirdly**, I am confirmed by Compass/Carr results in my concern about upcoming challenges to our ministry at First Lutheran. Our building faces some issues. Our Constitution needs a major reworking so that we can govern ourselves effectively. Our Early Childhood unit is full with a waiting list – how will we handle this? Our school has some challenges. And we as God's people who are still sinners, face some challenges within our congregation. Even within our own beloved "Lutheran Church Missouri Synod" we experience challenges such as the practice of "open communion" in other congregations and other teachings and practices that are problematic for us as "Confessional Scriptural orthodox Lutherans." There is a certain "cleaning- up" and "making-ofplans" that is needed before we begin again the process to call a new "Senior" Pastor - lest we obtain the same results. How long will this take? I suppose you – the congregation – will determine that.

Lastly, my main concern as Pastor here at First Lutheran in Knoxville is that – while we confront our challenges – we remain true to the teachings of Holy Scripture and the teachings of the Book of Concord as "the" -(not "a") - correct exposition of Holy Scriptures. As I heard it put so well recently by Al Collver III, "without the Lutheran Confessions we will lose the Scriptures." And that is most certainly true. I know that all of the above concerns will be handled – one way or another. But we must hold fast to the Book of Concord, the Lutheran Confessions, as the correct exposition of the Holy Scriptures, which are the inerrant and infallible Word of God. Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word. That is what matters.

And following in this line of thought, I urge all of you to attend Bible Class and make sure your children are in Sunday School. A congregation that is not actively involved in the study of God's Word is headed in the wrong direction. We are called by God to teach our children God's love for us through His Only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ. And we need to constantly be taught God's Word so that when we come into challenging times – such as we now experience at First Lutheran – we have the

background, based in God's teachings – by which we can make solid, Godly decisions. So many times, decisions in the church are made according to the ways of the world. Dear ones, as God's children we are to be in the world, but not of the world.

I pray as Christ's undershepherd at First
Lutheran Church in Knoxville, TN.at the present
time (Isn't that all we have?) - that the Lord will
continue to bless you and keep you. You are God's
children. He loves you and gave his only begotten
Son unto suffering and death for you – so that your
sins are forgiven and that you may have LIFE
ETERNAL. May the Eternal Triune God bless First
Lutheran Church and School. The Lord be with you
all.

# Other News and Happenings

STEWARDSHIP – When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3).

And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures, who gave her everything she had, who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil, who called her by the Gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament, would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us.

So what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide. We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Cor. 16:1-2, 2 Cor. 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Cor. 8:7).

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the

rest fall through your fingers to your neighbors – your family, your friends, your community, your church.
