The Pastor as One Who Feeds and One Who Must Be Fed

Much is written and said about the Pastor as the Under-Shepherd of Christ's Flock, the congregation. A good definition that I found and copied for the word "pastor" is "to lead to pasture, set to grazing, cause to eat." The pastor's main function is to feed the flock. But, of course, he has many other functions as pastor. He also "teaches the flock" to recognize the voice of its true shepherd, the Lord Jesus Christ. In addition to feeding, the pastor also protects and guides and encourages and does countless other things as He serves as pastor and as the under-shepherd to the true Shepherd, Christ Jesus. In this letter, however, I would like to discuss the pastor as "feeder."

The pastor feeds the congregation – the flock of Christ's sheep – with the Word and with the Sacraments. He gives them good solid spiritual food to strengthen them as they struggle against the forces who rule in this sinful, corrupted world. That good solid food is the Word of God. There is no other food that will sustain Christ's sheep. The pastor gives them good solid teaching and preaching. He does not give them of himself – he gives them what has been given to him by God in Christ. The pastor gives good solid spiritual food that forgives sins and strengthens faith. And he gives the sheep Christ's wonderful sacraments – Holy Baptism and the Holy Supper.

Holy Baptism is not just plain water but it is God's Word of promise and God's Holy Triune Name added to the water. It is a life-giving water, full of grace – full of undeserved pardon. The benefits of baptism are "forgiveness of sins, rescue from death and the devil, and eternal salvation to all who believe this as the words and promises of God declare." (Small Catechism) Holy Baptism is not a one-time event, but it is a lifetime event. Each time the baptized one confesses his sins and receives absolution he is returned to his original baptized state – he is cleansed of sin. Each time the baptized one makes the sign of the cross, he remembers his baptism as the day he was received into the kingdom of God. The baptized one lives the baptismal life under the

cross of His Savior. The baptized one lives a baptismal life enlivened by repentance that consists of confession of sins and faith in the absolution given by God through the Pastor.

The baptized one hungers for God in Christ. The main way that this hunger is satiated is when the baptized one receives the body and blood of his Savior at the Lord's Holy Supper where he remembers the Lord's death until He comes again. The Words of Institution are said carefully by the Pastor as he repeats the very words Christ said on the night when He was betrayed. What precious words these are! What precious food this is! For Christ comes to us – physically and spiritually – in a mysterious manner ("musterion" in the Greek – translated as "sacrament"). Christ comes to us – in, with, and under – the bread and the wine to be our God and our Shepherd and our Savior and our Redeemer and all of the other Names and offices that He occupies.

Word and Baptism and the Holy Supper are God's life-giving food. The pastor feeds the flock he has been given by God with these God-given things – not with philosophy or man's wisdom or his legacy or anything else. And as the pastor feeds his flock he must also be fed. I remember one of my pastors used to say quite often to those of us who were his elders, "Guys, if I don't have time to feed myself, I can't feed you." What he meant by that is this: Though the Pastor is constantly studying and working in the Scriptures to feed the flock, if he doesn't have time to read the Scriptures and other devotional material based on Scriptures - if the Pastor doesn't have time to read the Lutheran Confessions - if the Pastor doesn't have time to meditate and ponder the wonders and mysteries of God - if the Pastor doesn't have time to be fed, then he becomes empty – he won't have enough spiritual strength to feed the flock given to him by God.

So, First Lutheran, as you go about calling a man to be your next pastor, leave your pastor enough time in his busy schedule to be fed – to feed himself on the Word of God. I know, we all have our ideas about what our Pastor needs to do, what his first priority should be, what his second priority should be, etc.

But, truth of the matter is that his ordination and installation vows very well define what his priorities are. To do anything else would be to ask him to break his vows. We can demand so much of him that we don't leave him time to feed himself.

In addition to that, we should leave him enough time to be a person – to have time with his family – to exercise and take care of his body and health – to have time for entertainment and refreshing. This congregation has somewhere around 450 members and many boards and a school and ECE that has about 170 or so students with a staff of about 35. There are many meetings and events. There are worship services and Bible classes. There are hospital and nursing home and home visitations to be made. There are individual sessions of confession/absolution and counseling. There are conferences and circuit meetings to be attended. Yet there is only one pastor. I remember the wife of one our most recent pastors saying of her husband, "He is never at home."

These are some things for you to think about. Pastor burnout is very common these days. Pastoral health problems related to stress are very common also. Add to that the fact that as people of faith, we are engaged - as the Militant Church - in a spiritual battle against the devil and his demonic forces. The pastors of the Militant Church are its commanders in this spiritual battle. Even more stress.

Don't load him up before he comes. Don't load him up after he comes. Leave him some room. Give him some time. I know that we all want what we want, but when he comes he will be the pastor. Don't attempt to lead him. Support him as your God-given shepherd. He has been trained and equipped well. He is to lead you. He will be your God-given pastor and your under-shepherd of Christ. He will lead you gently – he will not break a bent reed or snuff out a smoldering wick. But, your pastor is flesh and blood. He has his limits.

Ponder these things in your heart. They are worthy of your pondering.

STEWARDSHIP – Why do we give? Is it simply because God commands us to? Or is there more to it? To be sure, the instruction and Word of God in the Bible says we should give, and this is sufficient to encourage us to give (Luke 6:38; Acts 20:35; 1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:7; Gal 6:6).

But there's more to it than just obligation. We're not just trying to fulfill a work of the Law. We are bearing fruits of the Spirit given to us by our Father in heaven through His Son our Lord Jesus Christ. In other words, we're not just doing what our Father said, we're also doing what He did.

Children emulate their parents. When they grow up they often carry many of the same mannerisms and characteristics as their parents, but there is more to it than that. Children copy their parents even on a more mundane level. They watch how their parents cross their legs, how they fold their hands, how they stand and sit and walk, how they do and say most everything.

And children try to copy it, which can be quite humorous when parents wish they wouldn't. It can be uncomfortable and embarrassing if a child copies or repeats something less than polite that they learned from a parent. Sitcoms thrive on these situations. It only happens because children emulate their parents because they want to be like them.

We are the children of God, by grace, through faith. In Holy Baptism, God the Father declares of us what He declared of Jesus at His Baptism in the Jordan: "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." God the Father claims us as His own. He takes away all our sins, and in exchange He gives us His righteousness, His purity, His holiness, and His Spirit, by which we cry out, "Abba, Father."

We are born again, born from above, born of water and the Spirit, to a new life in Christ as His children. We are sons of God in Christ, through Baptism. And since we are sons, we are heirs – heirs who share in the glory of the Son of God. The inheritance is ours because of the Father's grace and mercy, His generosity in sending His Son in time to save us for all eternity.

And this is why we give generously of our income to the

And this is why we give generously of our income to the work of the church. We don't do this simply because He has commanded us so to do; it is because we, as His children by grace, want to emulate His generosity in our own lives. He is our Father; we are His children. And children want to be like their parents.

Students beamed up at their guests, thrilled to have them at their school. In the classrooms, students honored their elders giving gifts, reading stories, and asking questions. I watched 3rd and 4th grade students serve their guests refreshments before serving themselves. Through it all, the love and respect shown from one generation to another demonstrated the Holy Spirit working in the hearts of all who were there.

Though the source has been debated, I always loved the quote attributed to St Francis of Assisi, "Preach the gospel always, if necessary use words." Think for a moment about how much better the world would be if we took that message to heart, if we acted like Christians rather than just talked like it. Think about the example we could set not just for our family or our students, but for strangers and unbelievers.
