Of the Faith Life

Well, most of you know that I did not grow up in the Lutheran Church. I grew up in a church within a denomination where Baptism and the Lord's Supper were only symbols. They were regarded as things that are representative somehow. Neither Baptism nor the Lord's Supper was considered as God's activity among men but rather man's activity before God. Neither Baptism nor the Lord's Supper – according to the teaching of the church where I grew up – did anything. They were just nice little rites.

In my early 20's I met a little Lutheran girl to whom I took a fancy. At the same time I was drawn by the teaching of the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions – especially the Small Catechism of Martin Luther. After we were married I was confirmed into the Lutheran Church as an adult. My instruction paled in comparison to the six years of youth catechetical teaching that my wife received – half a day on Saturdays every Saturday during the school year. To say that she loved every minute she spent in youth confirmation classes would be a lie. But – now – she appreciates what she was given during those Saturday mornings in the late 50's and early 1960's at Trinity Lutheran in Memphis, Tennessee.

Through my twenties and thirties and forties, I lived as a sinner who was also a saint only through the grace of God alone by faith alone in Christ alone. After a series of life priority changes that I take no credit for – and while still being a sinner I began seminary instruction at the age of 54 in 2002. I loved most every minute of my three years in classes at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I served my vicarage year and was ordained in 2006. I had bought into the teachings of the Evangelical Lutheran Church about 95% I would say – but according to the vow I took I had bought into the Lutheran Church by 100%. Sometimes we take vows before God and are disingenuous. Yet, He doesn't strike us down - like He probably should. He doesn't break a bent reed, so to speak. But - in the next four or five years - serving as a pastor within the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod - I bought into the teachings of Confessional Lutheranism completely - 100%.

And so, I tell you all of this because you can probably relate to it in your faith life – especially those of you who have a lived a life of many years. You have seen your faith grow. You have come to see the wisdom of God's Word. You have come to see how God works in your life through the Word and Sacraments. You have come to see how God is patient and loving and graceful with you – even in areas of unbelief God is working to strengthen your faith and trust in Him.

And finally to the point I am attempting to make, God is at work within our youth to do His will. And His work and will is that our confirmands live a life of faith and trust in the "Only One and True Living God" who has given His Only Begotten Son into the flesh and suffering and death for them. I hope that the Holy Spirit will continue to do His Work in the eight youth who were confirmed on November 4 which was – by the way - All Saints Day. Our eight youth joined all the saints in heaven at the Marriage Feast of the Lamb – at the Table of Our Lord – on November 4, 2018. It is my hope that they will remain at this Marriage Feast throughout their lives and into eternity. For you see, as baptized children of God, God put His Name on them and claimed them as his family. Now, having confirmed their baptismal vows with their own voices, they eat at the family table of God - the eternal Marriage Feast of the Lamb. What a great joy for me – as their pastor – to have taught them the basics of the Christian Faith in the pages of the Small Catechism of Dr. Martin Luther whose foundation is the Holy Scriptures.

I would like to thank the eight students who were so faithful in their attendance at class. I would like to thank them for their willingness to learn and do their work. I would like to thank them for their attentiveness and good behavior in class. This is the best overall confirmation class that I have ever taught. I give much credit for this to our school and our teachers and staff—and their parents. I am very thankful that the Lord allowed me to be their pastor and teacher. To Trevor Anderson, Ayden Laing, Olivia Wolford, Jayda Turner, Sofia Weideman, Abby Sanderson, Denver Slifka, and Joshua Keyes go my thanks and appreciation and encouragement.

May the Son of the Only True and Living God be with "The 8 of 2018." May you live in Word and Sacrament the rest of your temporal lives for then you

STEWARDSHIP – Throughout his epistles and his preaching recorded in the Book of Acts, St. Paul refers, in one way or another, to thanksgiving and thankfulness nearly 50 times. Whether vertically toward God, or horizontally toward the neighbor, thanksgiving is a major theme within St. Paul's body of work.

What does this mean? It means thankfulness is intrinsic to the life of those baptized into Christ. In other words, giving thanks is what Christians do as they live out their lives in this world.

The problem is that we often forget this. Consider your average, run-of-the-mill, normal day. When you get home, and your parents, your spouse or your children ask about your day, what first comes to your mind? After 99 percent of things went right, went exactly as planned, were enjoyable and blessings, we tend to focus on and remember the 1 percent of things that went poorly, that didn't go as planned, and that were nuisances.

We remember the bad things. We focus on discontent. And we fail to give thanks in all circumstances for everything (Eph. 5:20) and to rejoice in the Lord always (Phil. 4:4).

Thankfulness and contentment go together. We are content with things for which we are thankful. St. Paul could be content with having plenty or when in need because He gave thanks to the Lord for all things. He thanked the Lord for those who had prayed for him and listened to his proclamation of the Gospel. He gave thanks for their good works in and for the Church of Christ. He gave thanks for the grace of God in Christ Jesus and found that God's grace was sufficient for him.

So, give thanks for all things and in all circumstances dear brothers and sisters in Christ. For you have been saved from sin, death, and hell by the death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. You have been added to the very family of God in an adoption of grace through Holy Baptism. God is your Father. Our Lord, Jesus Christ is your brother.

Give thanks for these things. Make a list – every morning if you must. Say them out loud. Sing about them within the congregation of the saints. And remember this: God has given you these things so that you may be of service to those around you – your family, your neighbors, your brothers and sisters in Christ. For to whom much is given; much shall be required (Luke 12:48).

Dear Friends,

Each day before school begins, the staff gathers together for devotions and prayer. Some days it feels like we need just *one* more cup of coffee, and other days laughter replaces the yawns. But no matter our mood as we arrive in the room, it means a great deal to all of us to start our day focused on Christ. Sometimes during this time, God is not so subtle, and the devotions that are shared seem to hit right at the heart of the challenges we are facing. It

might be a reminder to turn our worries over to God or to forgive those who have wronged us.

This morning our devotion was about holiday traditions. It reminded us that a preoccupation with tradition and doing things "just so" can interrupt the joy of the holiday season and distract from the true message which is the birth of our Savior. I thought about how my holiday traditions have changed over the years. Thanks to my husband, red cabbage is now a Thanksgiving staple. Traditions are wonderful, but new traditions are just as special because they represent the new love and new people who have come into our lives.

Later in the day, I along with other staff members, was reflecting on our school's purpose and future. I realized later how easy it is was for us to get caught up in tradition. It is far too easy to say, 'we can't do that,' or 'it has never been done that way'.

I have been active at this school since 2000, and I have seen many things change over that time. Some were even long held traditions which some people might have thought would never end. New traditions have also begun. The school has been around for nearly 150 years, and I am confident there are traditions which have been lost that no one even remembers. In all that time, people came and went guided by God's hand to serve First Lutheran in their own way, and over time traditions have changed.

Even with all those small changes, First Lutheran School has remained as a mission in this community, serving students and their families by providing a loving, Christ-centered environment where students can grow in mind, body, and faith. First Lutheran has become a tradition in and of itself. Though the details may change, our heart and our core values remain the same: serving God and serving our students.

So this Christmas when you are hotly debating whether to serve turkey or ham, or trying to decide if you should open presents Christmas Eve or Christmas morning, remember the traditions that are truly important: worshiping our Savior and serving our Lord.
