## From the Vacancy Pastor

"My life is for the birds," someone said to me recently, bemoaning one personal crisis after another with no prognosis for improvement in the foreseeable future. "My life is for the birds!" As if birds hold little worth. To be sure, we tend to view birds on the "cheap side" of things. After all, in the days of Jesus, two sparrows would be purchased for a penny (Matt. 10:29), and the real bargain was five sparrows for two pennies (Luke 12:6). Yet, from God's way of valuing, birds were precious. Says Jesus, "Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten by God." And the point of Jesus? Simply this: If God is keeping track of sparrows, you better believe He's keeping track of you—you and I are even more precious in His sight! "Don't be afraid," said Jesus. "You are worth more than many sparrows." God values us in the love He has for us, love He has shown to us and given to us in His beloved Son, Jesus. By His death and resurrection for us, Jesus took away from us all that could finally devalue and empty us, and He filled us with the worth of being children of the heavenly Father. Even through those days that twist us into knots with hurt and loss, Jesus is God's in-the-flesh promise that He will never forget us—that He values us as dear and precious children whom He holds and carries and cares for in faithful, unchanging love. Because God so values us, our life—even in the darkest and most trying days—can be like the birds. Looking skyward one day, Jesus caught sight of several birds lifted and carried upon the breezes of the Father's good pleasure. "Consider the birds of the air," said Jesus. "They do not sow or reap or store away into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Therefore do not worry about your life..." (Matt. 6:25-34). So my brother and sister in Christ: when you come upon times and situations where you feel like your life may be of little value and worth, look skyward. Catch sight of those winged creatures and recall how precious in God's sight they are—and even more so, you! And, considering them, thank God that your life is like the birds, especially

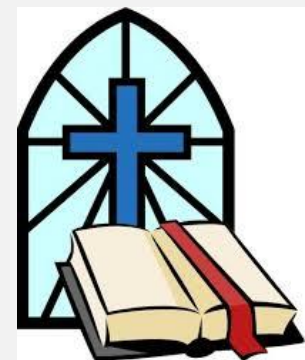

## In Other News

**Stewardship:** Whenever the topic of stewardship and giving comes up, the conversation inevitably turns to the question: "How much should I give?" Answers will vary because the motive behind such questions also vary.

Sometimes the motive behind asking this question is for self-justification. Even though, as Lutherans, we know we are not saved by our works but by grace through faith because of Jesus' substitutionary atonement, the natural religion of fallen man is to earn God's favor by what we do.

Take, for example, the response of our Lord to the rich young ruler who asked, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus first tells him to keep the commandments. The rich young ruler responds by indicating that all this he has kept from his youth. But Jesus tells him that he lacks one thing: He must sell all he has and give it to the poor and then follow Him.

This rich young ruler went away sad because he was quite wealthy and could not part with his possessions. Here we see that those who seek to justify themselves by their giving will hear a response that intensifies the duty that God places upon them. Indeed, they will hear a response that makes it impossible to win God's favor by their works.

But to those who genuinely desire to know their duty as Christians in the arena of giving, we look to the Bible for our answer. We believe the Bible is the Word of God. And we know that the Word of God has been "breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim. 3:16–17).

Since Christ became poor for us in order to make us rich in Him – blessing us with the riches of heaven – so we have also been so blessed to follow the example of our Lord and Savior and give of ourselves and the work of our hands to bless others with the same.

And let us do so not begrudgingly, but for the joy set before us – with a spirit of eagerness, cheerfulness, and love – to share the blessings of God with those placed into our care.

### Lutheran Teachers are a Blessing

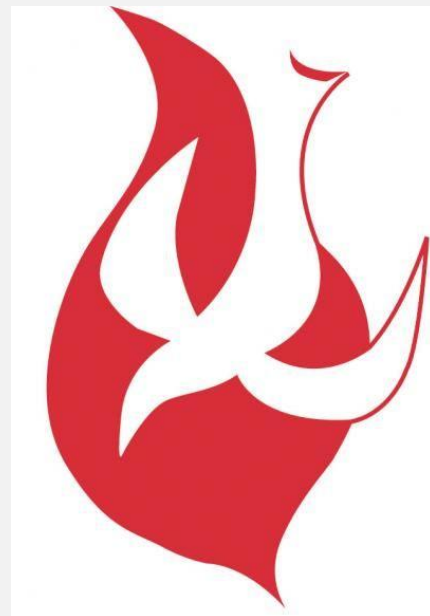
Greetings to you each of you in the name of Jesus, our Risen Lord and Savior! God's great peace through His Son is yours today.

It is with great peace that we also have that same partnership with our heavenly Father because of Jesus' death and resurrection for all believers. I pen these concluding thoughts to recognize and affirm your marvelous effort to teach young adults and children about their Lord and Savior.

**Nurturers Indeed:** When one chooses to serve the church, or to instruct adults or children in a God-fearing manor, the reason is not for wealth or fame; rather, that decision is made in prayer and continued with a life-long yearning for growth in two areas: professional and spiritual.

**Professional** Teachers in our Lutheran schools are indeed very professional. Professional is just what it implies – growth in the profession of teaching. Your academic training has equipped you to know what is best in pedagogy and curriculum, child psychology and development as well as planning and assessment for the students entrusted to you. You strive to remain current in those areas through conferences, workshops, and additional course work. And by doing so, your instruction brings about a learning experience for a life "worthy of one's calling" to which we have been called (Ephesians 4:1-5).
