As father and son sat down together and family greetings tapered off, it became evident that this was "Krause Appreciation Night" at First Lutheran. The words flashed on a projection screen, and there followed 15 minutes of documentary slides depicting the educational director at his many task: through the years-as organist, choir didector, Bible Class instructor, school principal and teacher, on the athletic field and in the school and church.

Rev. Julius Kimpel of Oak Ridge, circuit counselor for the denomination, led off testimonials by 10 church officials as to the excellence of service rendered by Mr. Krause at First Church and in the community.

Bob Lund, president of the congregation, brought the testimonials to a close by proferring a "cash gift" of appreciation, and the congregation moved to the church sanctuary for a formal service of thanksgiving. The speaker: Rev. W. E. Krause of St. Louis. Music: two special numbers by the choir, rehearsed secretly when their director was not around to hear.

Sparking the celebration perhaps — besides the anniversary date-was the knowledge that only a few weeks ago Wilbert Krause declined a call to the Chicago area for a much easier and more lucrative job. He elected to stay with the responsibilities set for himself here.

Bringing Mr. Krause's father here for the celebration recalled a brief absence requested by the First Lutheran director in 1958. when he and his six brothers gathered in St. Louis to attend their father's honorarium. The elder Mr. Krause at that time observed his 50th anniversary in the Lutheran ministry.
