From the Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Advent's upon us. It's that time of year. There are songs of cheer on the radio and in churches. There are wreaths hung, and not always with care. Cookies are eaten and hot chocolate and eggnog are drunk by fires while wearing comfortable pajamas.

"He is coming!"

There's a joy in Advent that betrays the darkness that is around us. The sun is setting earlier and earlier. The days are short and getting shorter. And yet, we have light. Christmas lights all around us. Lights that testify to the coming Sun of Righteousness, the Bright Morning Star. Lights on houses that blink and flicker with glee. Lights on trees and lamppost that will line our fair city streets. Even our wreaths will get brighter and brighter.

Only time held by Christ gets darker and has more light at the same time.

That's Advent. A season of waiting. A season of repentance. A season of hope. A season of anticipation of the King who comes just and having salvation. He is the King who becomes a Servant to redeem and save His Bride.

"He is coming!"

The hymn "What Child Is This" helps us understand why we wait and what we celebrate. In stanza one we sing, "What child is this, who laid to rest, On Mary's lap is sleeping?" (LSB 370 st 1) Sleeping as a newborn babe in His mother's embrace and lap with tears of joy welling her eyes and moistening her cheeks. Thirty-three years later, He will rest one last time on His mother's lap when taken down from Calvary's wooden throne. He will be upon her lap resting from all that He had accomplished for our salvation. One last motherly embrace with tears of sorrow welling her eyes and moistening her cheeks. His death pierced her soul.

On Christmas, the King appears to us in servant's clothes. The King is not alone, though. As we gather and celebrate His birth, we are reminded of His impending death where "Nail, spear shall pierce Him through, The cross be born for me for you." (LSB 370 st 2) We see the cost of following Him and believing in Him. We may end up martyred like St. Stephen (Dec 26), some may die in old age like St John the Apostle and Evangelist (Dec 27), or young like the innocent children of Bethlehem (Dec 28).

And yet, there is joy. Joy in sadness. Light in darkness. "Joy, joy, for Christ is born, The babe, the son of Mary." (LSB 370 st 3)

"He is coming!"

Christmas is coming. It is a joyous time of feasting. The Church feasts upon the Word of God in sermon, song, and sacrament.

We hear the proclamation of the message of the angels: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10-11). We receive the proclaimed Savior, Christ the Lord, not wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in manger but wrapped in bread and wine placed into our mouths for the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. We feast in great joy indeed because of this great blessing from our Lord and God.

God's people in ancient Israel also feasted with great joy. The Lord showered His abundant blessing on His people. And He commanded them to feast upon it (Deuteronomy 16). The people were to go to the place appointed, where the Lord would make His name dwell, and give offerings, each man as he was able, according to the blessing of the Lord that He had given them (Deut. 16:10, 15, 17). And there the Lord would bless them with joy as they feasted upon what the Lord had provided.

We feast on the Word who became flesh to dwell among us, not just during Christmas but throughout the year. We feast not just on the salvation He has wrought for us in His Son, but we feast also on all the temporal blessings that God gives. We enjoy the rich bounty that God provides, not only in Word and Sacrament, but also in house and home, property and income, family and friends.

Let us then, as did our brothers in the faith from ancient Israel, give as we are able. Let us, like them, give generously of the first fruits of our income, which He gives, so that all may know and enjoy the salvation He gives and the joy we have in the Savior born in the city of David, who is Christ the Lord.
