

From the Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters at First Lutheran,

Now we are in the throes of Lent. So here's a little breakdown of the season filled with 40 days of fasting, prayer and repentance. However, Lent breakdowns into three different sections. Each section has their own changes to the liturgy reflecting what Christ Himself is going through.

The first period of Lent is Ash Wednesday through the historic lectionaries week which begins with Laetare Sunday. The name comes from the first few words of the Introit in Latin, "Laetare Jerusalam" or "Rejoice, O Jerusalem" from Isaiah 66:10. This is also called Rose Sunday because a golden rose was given by the pope to a prominent individual and the clergy wear rose colored chasubles and stoles. Laetare this year is March 14 or Lent 4. This Sunday acts as a break in our increasing repentance and faith.

Next we have Passiontide which begins Judica or "Judge Me" Sunday, March 21. Again, the title comes from the Latin Introit, this time from Psalm 43. Here the liturgy gets stripped away more and more. The liturgy is spoken. Less joy. More sorrow and contemplation of the Sacrifice. No Gloria after the Introit. The crucifix is veiled until Easter Sunday and Eastertide begins.

The second week of this section is Palm Sunday that begins with the crowds and us rejoicing as Jesus enters His city and the quick change to sorrow over what is coming during the week as the liturgy is stripped as He will be.

The third section of Lent is Holy Week itself. Here the Passion narratives are read according to the four Gospels. We're in the upper room as Jesus' washes feet and institutes His meal. And if a church does two services on Good Friday you're at the foot of the cross with the reproaches spoken by Jesus at the first and the later Tenebrae, the extinguishing of candles as Jesus' life is extinguished.

Holy Saturday's historic Matins remembers Jesus' rest in the tomb where He sanctifies — makes holy — our tombs and graves. That night is the Great Vigil that beings in darkness and ends in the glorious light of the resurrection.

Next month we will begin a several newsletter series on our statement "Strengthened by the Means of Grace, we faithfully witness to Christ in the community, and passionately share God's love through acts of mercy."

Stewardship

Hudson Taylor, a Nineteenth Century British missionary to China, is reported to have said, "God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word. Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Cor 10:5). Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life-giving, faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to gives thanks for His daily provision of it. God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned on the mount of the Lord it will be provided. The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return.



Each chapter draws on lip product analogies and uses humor, anecdotes, and observations to introduce Scripture passages that address common behaviors and attitudes. And each day's reading includes Bible study questions and suggestions for personal reflection.
