From the Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Strengthened by the Means of Grace we faithfully witness to Christ in the community and passionately share God's love through acts of mercy." We've discussed four of the five pillars that make up the above statement. For review, we have discussed Worship, Education, Witness, and Fellowship. Today, we take up the last pillar, Mercy.

Mercy, as a pillar, applies to those both in and out of our Congregation. Many who need acts of Mercy, or human care, because they're sick, lonely, orphans, widow, widower and so on. The center of our Mercy is the cross of Christ. There on the wood of Calvary Jesus came to serve us and to be the ransom that pays for our sins.

Acts of Mercy are acts of providing and serving those in need. Our example of Mercy is Jesus, who "**came not to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many**." (Mark 10:45) Mercy is not below any individual to give because it is created by the love of Christ which dwells in us richly. Jesus' obedience to the Father brought Him to the cross where, out of love for us, put our sins to death in His cross. His love for us causes us to seek our neighbor's good, serve them, and show them His Mercy. We serve Jesus by being a Little Jesus for others.

Our focus on Mercy being both in and out of the congregation highlights the overlap of Mercy, Witness, and Fellowship. Our lives, strengthened by the Word preached and given in the Sacraments, and taught to us our students, enlivens us. In other words, our pillars of Worship and Education underline, reinforce, and even create our other three pillars of Mercy, Witness, and Fellowship.

It is important to remember that even though Mercy, Witness, and Fellowship, overlap they are still different and offer us unique opportunities both at First and in the Knoxville area. For example, a member goes out to Witness a neighbor, they may also engage in an act of Mercy. Or, if in a Fellowship opportunity a fellow member shows a need, you may engage in an act of Mercy for them.

In the end, Mercy is human care for those in and out of First Lutheran. Mercy bears Witness to our Lord who came to serve. Mercy is part of our Fellowship and our life together at First. All flow from Christ's love for us while we were still sinners in His death upon the cross and resurrection on Easter.

Stewardship

When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).


"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures; who gave her everything she had; who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this.

Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire.

In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34–40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

News from First Lutheran School

Summer day camp has come to a close and the excitement of returning to school is upon us. The frenetic cleaning, organizing, and preparing has begun because it doesn't matter how hard a teacher works over the summer there are still about a million things left on their list. One of the things I had to do is clean out cabinets in the Principal's office. In the process I found what I thought was a wonderful summary of what makes Lutheran schools unique. As we enter this new school year, I know I will be using it as a regular reminder of the work God is doing at First Lutheran.

Religion Instruction and Quality Lutheran Schools

"With religion playing such an important part of First Lutheran School, just what does First Lutheran teach concerning religion? The following is an excerpt from a pamphlet written by Carl J. Moser, a former Director of Schools for the synod. It details what Lutheran schools teach concerning religion.

Lutheran schools are known for their academic quality and for their ability to aid moral development. They are religious schools which include daily teaching about religion and integrate religious beliefs into everything they teach. Many parents/guardians of children in Lutheran schools or who are considering enrolling their child wonder, "What will they teach my child at a Lutheran school about religion?"

Lutheran schools exist to teach what Lutherans believe. They believe:

• that the Bible is the source of their beliefs (*2 Timothy 3:15-17*);

- that all people and all faiths are shown respect (*Matthew 22:39*);
- that only through faith in Jesus Christ can people be saved (*John 3:16*)

Lutheran schools teach about God. God is:

- the Almighty, loving Creator of everything and everyone (*Genesis 1:1*);
- one God, but three equal persons (Triune)(Matthew 28:19);
- a Judge who requires us to fulfill His law perfectly (*James 2:10*);
- a Savior Who died for our sins and arose from the dead (*2 Timothy 1:10*);
- a Sanctifier Who gives us faith through His Word and sacraments (1 *Corinthians 6:11*);
- the Author of the Bible Who inspired men to write every word as He directed (2 *Timothy 3:16*)
- described in His true, errorless, unchanging Word (the Bible)(*John* 17:17);
- love. He loves all people perfectly, in spite of how they may act (*1 John 4:8*).

Lutheran schools teach about people. People are:

- created individually and specially by God (*Psalm 139:13*);
- loved always and completely by God (John 3:16);
- required by God to obey His law perfectly (*Matthew 5:48*);
- unable to obey God perfectly (everyone sins)(*Ecclesiastes 7:20*);
- saved from Hell by Christ's sacrifice (*Galatians 3:13*);
- unable to earn God's favor or forgiveness (*Ephesians 2:8-9*);
- brought to saving faith by the Holy Spirit and given eternal life in heaven (1 Corinthians 6:11);
- condemned to eternal suffering if they do not have faith in Christ (*Romans 6:23*);
- given forgiveness of sins and eternal life through baptism and the Lord's Supper (Holy Communion)(*Acts 22:16; Luke 22:19-20*);
- motivated by God's love to love all other people and serve God (*John* 14:23);
- eager to share the Good News (Gospel of God's great love for all)(Acts 4:20)"

With this wisdom in mind, we know that by working together the Christian home, school, and church can prepare our students for the future. Providing from them an environment centered around Christ's love and God's Word, we know our students will thrive.
