




First Hearts November 2022

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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When a new year happens we make resolutions, things we're going to change. Some changes are for the good, some for the worse, and some we say we're going to do and never even start. One thing that will happen here at First with the new year, beginning with Advent, is a change in our lectionary.

We've been using a 3-year rotation of readings. Starting in Advent we'll be making the switch to a 1-year rotation of readings. So the question is why make the change? Below are twelve

reasons why. Why twelve? Well, there were twelve tribes of Israel, Jesus had twelve apostles, and I really wanted to make a list that included twelve.

1. It is catholic: It has a wide use of people, times, and places. Being catholic it joins us to the ancient, medieval, and until the 1960's, modern church. We're participating in something greater than our own time, place, and culture.

2 It is catechetical: Repetition is the mother of learning. You get the whole counsel of God every single year. It challenges and grows the faith of old and young alike.

3 Resources: You can find sermons from the church fathers, Martin Luther, Johann Gerhard, C F W Walther, and Bo Giertz on that text.

4 Hymnody: There is a wealth of hymnody and music specifically composed for Sundays in the Historic Lectionary. Plus Bach wrote a cantata for every week, except for Lent.

5 It is organic: It spent centuries evolving and improving. There's a natural ebb and flow to the readings. For example, in the Easter season you have readings for Jesus' resurrection, and the coming of the Holy Spirit, to prepare one for Pentecost.

6 It challenges preaching: The readings aren't academically assembled and sterile. There are times at first glance where the Epistle and Gospel don't fit together. But, in reality, the Epistle is pushing you in new directions on the Gospel.

7 No hobby horses: It forces the pastors to give the church a diet based on all of Scripture, not just the parts that he really wants to talk about.

8 Challenging Scripture: There may just be some sections of Scripture that people would rather pass over. However, we should tackle those difficult passages and preach the whole counsel of God.

9 No cultural agenda: The Word of God sets the agenda for worship, not the world.

10 Less is more: There are around 250 portions of scripture used in the Historic Lectionary. These portions of Scripture are repeated year after year. That means if one misses a year, they'll get what the missed the next year, instead of having to wait until the 3-year circles back around to those texts.

11 It gives a reason for the rose colored candle during Advent.

12 You get to show off your learning by saying words like "Septuagesima," "Sexagesima," and "Quinquagesima."

Stewardship What Makes for a Cheerful Giver?

St. Paul wrote to Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). *God loves a cheerful giver*. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.
